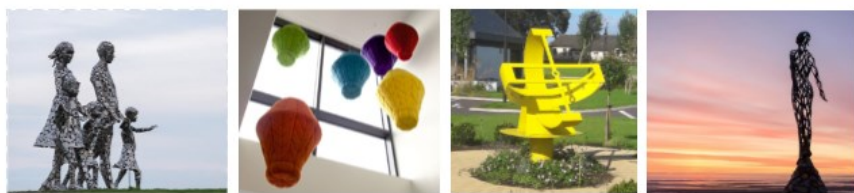


# Autumn 2021

## Meath Arts Office Newsletter



Welcome to the Autumn edition of the Arts Office newsletter.

With the recent Government announcements relating to the long awaited easing of Covid 19 restrictions, the arts sector can finally look forward to planning its long awaiting road to recovery. With the livelihoods, careers and futures of many artists and arts sector workers having been on hold for the past 18 months, this is welcomed news indeed.

This September, we will see the ever popular and growing Hinterland Festival return to a programme of 'in person' events. With a sterling line up of arts, literature, music and history talks, workshops, readings, conversations and performances, we look forward to experiencing the magical buzz this festival brings to the town of Kells once more.

SoFFT Productions have also announced an upcoming blend of filmed and live events in partnership with the Arts Office supported by the Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts, Gaeltacht, Sports & Media's Local Live Performance Scheme. 'Autumn Equinox - Until The Harvest Comes' & 'Until The Dew Falls' are a celebration of local music from Meath's finest.

In September we also have the inaugural Poetry Town Programme of workshops, virtual performances and community events occurring during the week of 10th—18th in Dunshaughlin and finally, Culture Night will take place on Friday September 17th this year. A few highlights from this year's Culture Night offerings include:

### **ALoud: Voices from Dunshaughlin and Beyond**

As part of Poetry Ireland's Poetry Town project this online event will include the reveal and presentation of the Poet Laureate's specially commissioned poem to the people of the town in a video production featuring additional contributions from local poets, artists and musicians.

### **Colmcille 1500 Illuminations**

The Colmcille 1500 Illuminations feature projected artworks celebrating the story of Colmcille through artistic expression and includes the iconography produced by monks, scribes, stonecarvers and metal workers at Kells monastery. The Colmcille Illuminations will be projected across the county at landmark sites on Culture Night to mark the 1500th anniversary of St. Colmcille's birth.

### **The CoClub presents:**

A contemporary artistic response through film to the life and legacy of Colmcille as part of the Colmcille 1500 celebration.

### **Irish Language Event:**

Meath County Council's Irish Language Officer Nóirín Murphy will facilitate a Zoom talk with Michael McCaughren of Clare County Council entitled: 'Irish, there is healing in the Language'

This flurry of new local Arts Activity is reflective of the change Autumn always brings; the harvesting of what has no doubt been a time of quiet growth and development for many artists as they germinated and developed ideas behind closed doors throughout these past months.

We look forward to a return of live and in-person events and to supporting our colleagues in the delivery of these.

## SPOTLIGHT ON PUBLIC ART : At the End of the Day by Patrick Barry



*At the end of the Day* by Patrick Barry is a monumental stone, copper, steel and zinc sculpture located at Knightsbrook roundabout, on the R154 Dublin Road on the outskirts of the vibrant and flourishing market town of Trim.

Patrick Barry undertook a BA Degree in Fine Art in Crawford College, Cork, where he discovered his passion for stone. The origin of stone, its formation, consistency and durability fascinated Barry. Here began his relationship with a medium that today is his life's passion. The artwork consists of a male figure in historic garments ringing a bell. The bell represents a common theme that runs through the heritage and architecture of the town.

The bell tower is 3.5m in height and has been fabricated from zinc. The male figure is 2m in height and is made from Kilkenny limestone. The bell is copper.

## Meath County Council Arts Office is shortlisted for an Excellence in Local Government Award 2021

Meath County Council Arts Office has been shortlisted for an Excellence in Local Government Award 2021 under the Sustaining the Arts Category for its RE:Form Initiative.

Re:Form is a 2021 initiative of Meath County Council Arts Office. It aims to directly respond to the challenges faced by the local arts sector caused by the Covid-19 pandemic through digital conversion. The initiative seeks to assist those working in the arts in County Meath to meet the fast-tracked requirements of digital transformation. It aims to empower the local arts sector to recognise the benefits of implementing digital technologies to the making of art and utilising digital platforms for its presentation. It aims to support this move through funding schemes, CPD opportunities, commissioning and programming.



The Excellence in Local Government Awards showcase best practice in local government and recognise the skills, hard work, innovation and enthusiasm within local government. The Excellence in Local Government Awards are held in conjunction with the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage.

The arts have taken a big hit during the pandemic. Continued support for the arts is hugely important for the vibrancy of an area's cultural landscape and is a way in which communities can be inspired to celebrate creativity amongst themselves. This award recognises initiatives by a Local Authority to further develop or promote the arts in their locality. The Excellence in Local Government Awards are due to take place on Thursday 18th November.



# 'Autumn Equinox - Until The Harvest Comes'

## A celebration of Local music from Meath's finest



This intimate event, set on the beautiful grounds of Dundererry Park County Meath, will celebrate and boast local Arts and Music from Meath on September 25th 2021. In total, 6 Acts will perform on one mainstage, built by wonderful craft makers to harmonise with the surrounding environment of nature. The event also falls on the Autumnal equinox, which marks the two moments in the year when the Sun is exactly above the Equator and day and night are of equal length and the celestial equator intersect. The energies of this special period in the calendar will be a force as it merges with the creative flow from those performing at the event and those attending. Certainly, it will be an experience to enjoy and cherish after such a long period of isolation for so many in one of the most uncertain times in modern history.

Featuring the fabulous talents of Those Nervous Animals, HAMSANDWICH; Oliver Cole ; Paddy Smith Band; Joy Booth and Bernadette Nic Gabhann, this is an evening not to be missed.

Along with musical performances, there will be a screening of the cinematic concept short film 'Until the Dew Falls', a homage to the Autumnal Equinox. The short film is ultimately based around the local community - drawing influence from the artists and directors engaging conversations and experiences with the locals on their cultural environment, along with captivating landscapes and places of historical significance. Keeping it organic, SoFFT Productions are working with local Meath artists to develop brand new pieces of music, dance and poetry which will be filmed at Loughcrew, joining together the poignancy of place with artistic expression.

## Kathleen McKenna Award 2021



As part of the Decade of Centenaries Programme 2012-2023, our friends at Solstice Arts Centre are delighted to announce an artist award to commemorate Irish republican activist and journalist Kathleen Napoli McKenna, born in Oldcastle, County Meath.

Artists of all disciplines are invited to submit a proposal for a work, or research for a work, that reflects on Kathleen McKenna, and/or, in relation to related feminist themes within the Decades of Centenaries.

Work can be in any form, including essay/written format.

An external panel will assess applications. Artists can submit proposals to the amount of €6,000, however, the panel may award more than one amount, dependant on application merit and demand.



Please note to ensure that you pay yourself/others a responsible and adequate fee; it is advised you measure your time, and proposal, in relation to amount of funding requested.

# DUNSHAUGHLIN NAMED CO MEATH'S INAUGURAL POETRY TOWN



Poetry Town, a new initiative, which will see more than a hundred free poetry-related activities take place in 20 towns across the island of Ireland between 10th and 18th September 2021. Dunshaughlin in Co Meath will be among the Poetry Towns, with activities for the town being organised by Poetry Ireland in partnership with Meath County Council Arts Office.

Orla Fay is appointed Poet Laureate for Dunshaughlin and has been commissioned to write a poem honouring her Poetry Town and its people.

There will also be a wide variety of other activities occurring for Poetry Town.

These will include a series of poetry events involving local poets; poetry schools workshops and competitions; public poetry displays, including 'Poetry Underfoot'; and a range of physical activities called 'Poems that Move You'.

Each workshop is made up of four one-and-a-half-hour sessions which will take place once a week.

A fee of €25.00 for your chosen workshop will be payable when a place has been offered and you have accepted the offer. Fees must be paid in full within three days of acceptance.

# Culture Ireland Funding



Culture Ireland offers support to Irish professional artists, arts organisations and international presenters to present work by Irish artists at significant International venues and festivals.

In supporting an event, Culture Ireland traditionally offers grant funding towards costs which relate directly to the international presentation of the event, i.e. travel and travel related costs such as transport, freight, accommodation and subsistence.

In response to the current Irish Government travel guidelines and the ongoing uncertain situation regarding international travel into 2021, Culture Ireland is now also accepting applications from Irish artists and Irish or International arts organisations for the presentation of work online to International audiences.

In order for an application to be considered, the applicant must have an International partner or be an International presenter who will provide a fee to the artist and assist with promotion and presentation costs.

Costs which will be considered by Culture Ireland include, but may not be limited to, technical and recording costs, venue hire, equipment hire, post-production costs and promotion services. A detailed breakdown of costs should be attached as a separate document when submitting the application.

**The next deadline for receipt of grant applications is 1st October 2021.** Applications for funding to present work internationally from 15th December 2021 onwards must be submitted by this date.

## IMO Youth Orchestra & Choir



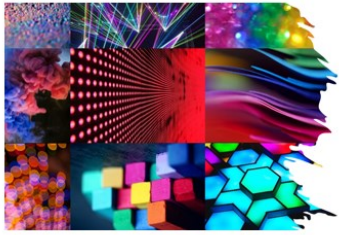

# Meath County Council Arts Office is pleased to announce the success of the 2021 Summer Funding Cycle



Following the July meeting of Meath County Council, the Arts Office is pleased to announce that a total of 29 awards were recommended across 4 streams of funding: the Arts Sector CPD Fund Round II, the Community Arts Award, the Drama League of Ireland Bursary and the Schools Musical Instrument Purchase Scheme.

These awards, together with the earlier Spring Funding Cycle, has seen support paid to 90 different artists, arts groups, community groups and schools across County Meath towards the development and sustainment of artistic activity in 2021 and represents a major boost for the arts locally.

The arts sector has been one of the hardest hit by the Covid-19 pandemic. Meath Arts Office has, through these funding cycles, and a suite of other artists' supports, focussed on helping local arts practices adapt and continue throughout this difficult period.

The 29 Summer Funding Cycle payments included 16 awards to schools throughout the county for the procurement of musical instruments via the Schools Musical Instrument Purchase Scheme. This scheme has been a longstanding successful tradition of Meath Arts Office in helping to ensure the young people of the county are continually offered opportunities in musical education and enjoyment. In the past 10 years, one hundred national and secondary schools have received grants payments through this scheme, enabling banks of musical instrument to be developed in schools across the county.

Since 2011 there have been 34 Community Arts Awards issued which have helped community groups and schools engage with professional artists to facilitate creative projects which enhance long term partnerships between the community and arts practitioners. This award has been accessed by such diverse groups as Mens' Sheds, Gaelic Football Clubs, Family Resource Centres, Tidy Towns Committees and schools.

Funding artists, arts activities and development is a key strategic objective of the Meath County Arts Development Plan 2019 – 2024. Meath Arts Office 2021 grants were bolstered by Creative Ireland funding and funding received through the Arts Council of Ireland. We will be announcing details of further schemes in the coming weeks. Art & Mindfulness



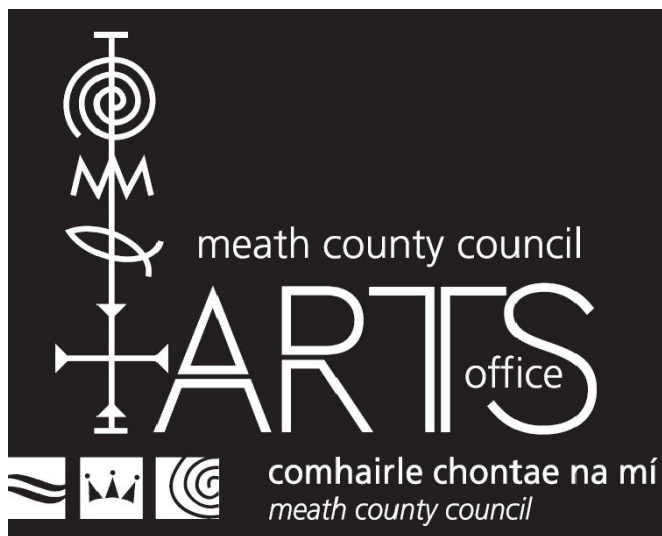
As part of the Meath County Council's Keep Well Campaign, Meath Arts Office was thrilled to present *In the Midst of Masters*; a mindful exploration of art.
