




- The approach of Meath County Council to achieving these actions is to Lead, Enable and Inspire
- **Lead** Meath County Council will deliver on climate action within its remit, including its own assets, services and infrastructure, as well as building resilience to the negative impacts of climate change, through the range of services and functions provided.
- Enable- Meath County Council will enable, facilitate and support sectors, business, communities and individuals, in the delivery of local climate actions, while also coordinating efforts with all stakeholders e.g. Decarbonising Zones, communities and businesses on local climate actions, and coordinating efforts to maximise effects and creating interactions.
- Inspire- Meath County Council will increase awareness, communication and engage in open dialogues on climate related issues and responses.

The **Climate Action Forum (CAF)** which is comprised of cross-party Council Elected Members was established in August 2019 and meets on a quarterly basis. The Climate Action Forum encourages community leadership, citizen engagement and enhances a two-way climate action conversation between Meath County Council and citizens.



Decarbonising Zones

Meath County Council has designated the 9 biggest towns in Meath as Decarbonising Zones. These are areas where local authorities and communities work together to reduce the amount of carbon produced by their everyday activities. By looking within the community for ways to live, work and play more sustainably, these zones can find local solutions to global problems, such as reducing greenhouse gas emissions, improving air quality, saving energy and reducing waste.



Trim Community Cup

- Inspired by Killarney Cup Campaign to remove disposable cups from their environment
- Collaboration with local coffee shops
- Encouraging customers to use returnable cups rather than disposable
- Pay a €2 deposit initially then return in any participating coffee shop for clean cup & fresh coffee. No waste, no litter, no problem!
- We need to promote the scheme to encourage behavior change.

Improved Air Quality Initiative

- Originated from an 'angry granny' in Trim Climate Action witnessing parents idling their engines outside schools
- Air quality outside schools tends to be poor because of this, with increased Carbon Monoxide, Particulate Matter & CO2.
- Trim Tidy Towns offered to help with designing & erecting signs. They approached the schools.
- Meath County Council were looking for projects for their 'Climate Action Month' & offered to help with funding.
- We have launched at certain schools & now other schools are getting in touch.

Dunshaughlin Community Centre –our story





Our Project

- Install 110 Solar panels on the roof of the Centre
- Install Inverter to generate 50 MWh per annum.
- Reduce Carbon emissions by 14,000 tonnes annum.
- Reduce our Electricity overhead






Outcome

- Generating in Summer months 100% own needs electricity from 6am until 7pm daily. Self Sufficiency.
- Exporting excess to the Grid and receiving credits
- Over 40 MWh generated since installation (end of March)
- Cost reduction in overhead compared to 2024 is in excess of €10k to date.



How did we get here.

- Energy Audit 2013
- List of recommendations
- Work off list as Finance allowed
- Last item was Solar (huge cost)
- Community Climate Action Programme supported.
